Exhibitors in all other departments are encouraged to make advance entries. However, entries will be accepted until 8 p.m. Sunday of Fair Week. For faster check in, pre-register your articles by mailing your entry blank to Sykesville Ag and Youth Fair, P.O. Box 71, Sykesville, PA 15865 prior to June 2, 2023 -OR- we encourage you to pre-enter your items online at www.sykesvillefair.com. Entries will be accepted Sunday, June 18 from 1-8 p.m. Entries will be released Sunday, June 25 from noon to 3 p.m.

Judging Monday, June 19, 2023.

GENERAL RULES

1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Sykesville Ag and Youth Fair.

2. The fair management reserves the right to amend or add these rules and regulations as its judgement may determine.

3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage but the fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.

4. Entries will be made according to classification.

5. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a ribbon or rosette. The fair reserves the RIGHT TO DETERMINE how many entries they will accept from an exhibitor in the same class, or, in the case of livestock, the same breed, and poultry, the same species.

THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL IN ALL CASES except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion - not discovered at the time of the award - is proved. In such cases, the superintendent, manager, or secretary or the fair or show, or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision. the case may be appealed to the Fair management or Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal.

6. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor TO PROPERLY NAME THE ARTICLE OR BREED OF LIVESTOCK he is entering. Any exhibit improperly entered will be disqualified to receive a premium, but the judges will make the correct name on the entry tag or the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made for the second time.

7. All entries must have been grown, produced, or made since the last fair by the person whose name appears on the tag as exhibitor. Any exhibitor may be required to prove ability to reproduce entry in any department in the presence of a qualified person.

8. Superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition. The fair reserves the right to remove any exhibit not worthy of viewing by the public.

9. Food products cannot be polluted with any substance or chemical that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food. Any such incidents must be reported to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Program for further review.

10. No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the fair except by consent of the Superintendent.

11. Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the fair or show which shall be supplied by the fair free of charge.

12. DEPARTMENT SUPERINTENDENTS MAY ENTER EXHIBITS IN THEIR OWN DEPARTMENTS, but neither they nor any other exhibitor may communicate with the judges during the time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by the judges.

13. All livestock offered for premiums must have been the property of the owners for thirty (30) days or longer. Health papers are to be issued in the name of the exhibitor.

14. The market animals should be weighed on the same set of scales under a qualified weigh master, under the direction of the fair.

15. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position, if in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.

16. Overfitting of cattle is discouraged. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.

17. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter in charge of owner or employee. The fair will have stand-by attendants available during the youth judging or showing, men designated if there is trouble with the animals.

18. Joint ownership is considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.

19. Intoxication, disorderly conduct, gambling and lewd or obscene conduct is strictly prohibited.

20. No unauthorized peddling will be permitted on the grounds or its vicinity.

21. No person will be permitted to act as judge of any class in which he may be an exhibitor.

22. In all departments, blue ribbons shall represent first place; red, second; yellow, third; white, fourth; lavender, fifth.

23. On all fair parking areas, the Sykesville Ag & Youth Fair and its officers or agents, will not be responsible for any accident, loss, theft, or damage. Park at your own risk.

24. The fair reserves the right to itself to construct its own rules, regulations, and to decide arbitrarily all matters in regard to formulate and enforce special

• Other official identification approved by USDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable)

2. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older (*market cattle are exempt*).

PENNSYLVANIA EQUINE ANIMALS:

Equines entering the fairgrounds must present a negative Coggins test and proof of rabies administered by an accredited veterinarian dated after May 1 of the current fair year.

PENNSYLVANIA GOATS:

• An official USDA scrapie eartag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie eartags at 1-866-873-2824, weekdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Your order may take several weeks for processing, so order tags early; or

• An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag starting with "840" (including RFID); or

• A USDA-approved custom scrapie eartag; or

• Goats having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.

PENNSYLVANIA SHEEP:

Requirements for PA Sheep:

Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required for all sheep. Official scrapie ID includes:

• A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or

• A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database; or

• Sheep having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.

Recommendations for Fair Animal Health Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.

2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

PENNSYLVANIA CAMELIDS:

Recommendations for Fair Animal Health Requirements:

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.

2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

3. Individual animal identification. ID options include:

• Official ID, including:

• An ISO-compliant 15-digit ear tag starting with "840" (including RFID).

• A state-approved tattoo; or

• An electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader); or

• A USDA-issued metal ear tag.

or

• On the AAI-13 (Certificate of Veterinary Inspection form obtained from the Department of Agriculture) accredited veterinarians simply need to:

✓ mark "Camelid" in box number 4;

✓ write the animal's color in box number 8;

✓ record date of birth in box number 10;

✓ record gender in box number 11; and

✓ record either "llama" or "alpaca" in box number 12

* In addition, veterinarians are encouraged to write down any distinguishing markings that are present on the animal.

26. No dogs allowed on fair grounds.

5. NO GRADE STALLIONS SHALL BE ACCEPTED FOR ENTRY.

6. ALL ANIMALS ENTERED MUST COMPETE AND BE SHOWN.

7. THE FAIR RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REFUSE ANY OR ALL ENTRIES.

13. All horse stalls must be cleaned by exhibitor before leaving fair. Any exhibitors not cleaning their stalls before removing their horses will forfeit their premiums. Stalls must be checked by Superintendent prior to leaving Fairgrounds. Cleaning of Horse Barn will take place Sunday 7:00 a.m. to noon.

14. For the Youth Show on Thursday, make your entries under Dept 100. Only Horses stabled all week at the Fair can compete in this Youth Show.

15. Tack stalls available only if number of horses entering permits.

16. See horse health regulations. Coggins Test is required for all horses.

35TH ANNUAL BLUE RIBBON APPLE PIE CONTEST

1. Open to any individual amateur baker who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest at any other fair in 2023.
3. Entire entry must be made from scratch. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.) All ingredients and decorations must be edible.
4. Recipe must include at least 60% apples in the filling. It does not need to be a "traditional" two crusted apple pie and it can have a variety of fillings.
5. The entire pie must be submitted for judging in a food safe disposable pie pan. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
6. The recipe for the pie and pie crust must be submitted with the entry. It should be submitted on one side of 8 1/2" by 11" paper. The recipe must list all the ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. Entrant's name, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and pies will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
7. Refrigeration is not available at the Fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
8. Judging will be based on the following criteria:

Creativity is essential to a varied competition. Do not limit your contest to a "traditional" two-crust apple pie. We are looking for a variety of fillings in the pies; the pie must include at least 60% apples in the filling. The recipe for the pie and pie crust will also need to be submitted when entering at the Pennsylvania Farm Show. Each Fair must submit the Contest Summary Report verifying the winning apple pie baker. This person will then be eligible to enter the state competition at the 2024 Farm Show and will receive the Official Certification Form from the PA Fairs Special Baking Contest Committee.

First Place Winner is eligible for the 2024 PA Farm Show competition.

- Hitch must be clear for hookup. (No weights hanging above hitch.)
- Tractors can pull in only one category (Farmstock, Antique, or Open)
- Tractors must be operated in a safe manner.
- No riders. while pulling
- Driver must remain seated at all times.
- Driver must have tractor in neutral when hooking to and from sled, with both hands raised in the air.
- Driver must slowly tighten chain and when given ok, with no jerking, pull at least 35 feet or two tries to move sled.
- NO waiting on pull track for next pull.
- No one on pull track except officials and puller.
- If any part of tractor goes out of bounds, it will be disqualified.
- If any parts fall off tractor, it will be disqualified.
- Tractor may be disqualified if front end rises to an unsafe height.
- Once tractor is weighed & approved, it must be taken to staging area not back to pits.
- All pulls will be at the pullers risk.
- Officials decisions are final. NO appeals will be heard or considered.
- Tractors may pull two weight classes with same driver.
- We have all stock equipment in place, its acceptable to replace generator with alternator or use electronic ignition.
- No modified tires Shaved, Cut, Radial, or Duals
- No tire chains
- Drawbar length minimum of 18 inches from center of axle
- Fuels allowed, automotive pump gasoline, diesel fuel, kerosene, and LP gas.
- Operator & one helper admitted to pits without charge. Add'l pit passes, \$20 ea.

ADDITIONAL RULES FARMSTOCK

- Factory hitch without modifications
- Factory working air cleaner.
- Tire size must be within one size of original
- Must pull in low gear with no shifting of torque, ground speed under 3 MPH
- RPM must be within 10% of original specifications

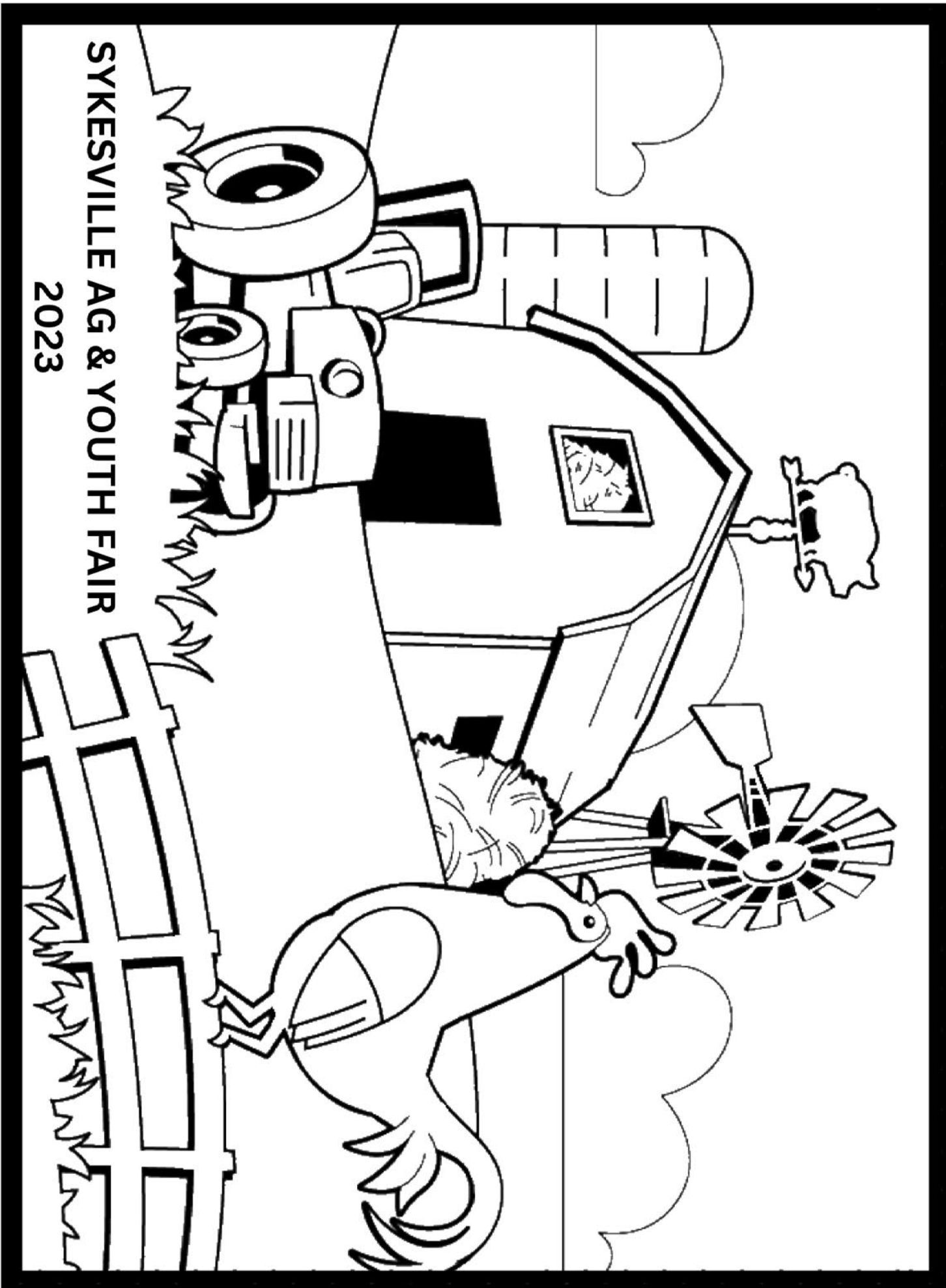
